# Creating a Community Emergency Plan

Whether it's a community or personal emergency plan, an emergency plan can help minimise the impacts of an emergency and improve resilience.

1. Who should you involve?
  - Stakeholder engagement – take a look at the step 1 of the community action page
2. Identifying risks
  - Identify the risks that are relevant to your area
    - Environmental risks
    - Infrastructure risks
3. Identify vulnerabilities
  - Who is likely to be most affected by this?
  - Where is likely to be most affected by this?
  - What is likely to be most affected by this?
    - Great opportunity to use participatory mapping
4. Identify people and organisations who can help in the event of an emergency
  - Identify the skills and resources they can provide
    - Volunteers
    - Tools
    - Supplies
    - Transport
  - How will you communicate with them in an emergency
    - Create a contact list
5. Key locations that could be useful in case of emergency
6. Emergency contact list
7. Test your plan
